**THE EFFECTS OF POLLUTED STORM WATER RUNOFF AND WHAT YOU CAN DO...**

When it rains, pollution such as litter, pesticides and household chemicals eventually end up in the ocean. This affects all of us because water is essential for life here in Hawai'i and we spend a lot of time playing in the ocean or eating seafood from the ocean. As a community, we can work together to make sure that our water resources are protected. We have provided some information about water pollution and things we can do to prevent water pollution.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) published the following information about polluted storm water runoff in December 2005 in its Fact Sheet 2.0:

“Polluted storm water runoff is often transported to Municipal Separate Storm Sewer Systems (MS4s) and ultimately discharged into local rivers and streams without treatment. EPA’s Storm water Phase II Rule establishes an MS4 storm water management program that is intended to improve the Nation’s waterways by reducing the quantity of pollutants that storm water picks up and carries into storm sewer systems during storm events. Common pollutants include oil and grease from roadways, pesticides from lawns, sediment from construction sites, and carelessly discarded trash, such as cigarette butts, paper wrappers, and plastic bottles. When deposited into nearby waterways through MS4 discharges, these pollutants can impair the waterways, thereby discouraging recreational use of the resource, contaminating drinking water supplies, and interfering with the habitat for fish, other aquatic organisms, and wildlife.”

All Department of Education schools are participating in the MS4 Storm Water Program in an effort to protect our water from pollution. Please refer to the Parent Handbook for more information on how Lincoln School is protecting our water from pollution. Prevent water pollution by reducing or eliminating hazardous waste discharge throughout our campus and neighborhood.

**NO DOGS ON CAMPUS + NO DOG DROPPINGS =  
HEALTH AND SAFETY FOR OUR STUDENTS**

We urge parents and community members to abide by our “NO DOGS ALLOWED” signs on campus in an effort to maintain our students’ health and safety. Individuals with dogs who pass through Lincoln School’s campus on their way to another destination are encouraged to pick-up any droppings left by their dogs.

Dogs make wonderful pets; however, most people are not aware that every time it rains, everything (including your dog’s droppings) washes down the city’s storm water system, straight into the ocean. Dog droppings are a health risk as they do not disintegrate into the soil. This is a serious problem. Dog droppings contaminate waterways with bacteria and nutrients which threaten human health, contribute to toxic algae blooms and suffocate marine life.

Dog droppings left on our campus (or even on your lawn at home) can pose serious health hazards to your children, you and your pets. Parasites are transmitted via dog feces. When infected dog droppings are on the ground, eggs of roundworms and other parasites can linger in the soil for several years. As a result, any pet or person who comes into contact with the soil has the potential to come into contact with the infected eggs. Hookworms can be transmitted from the infected soil or feces to people who walk barefoot. This is a concern as many of Lincoln School’s students wear slippers to school.

Dog waste often contains bacteria and parasites which may be communicable and harmful to humans – especially children. Children run the highest risk of infection because they play in the dirt and frequently put their fingers in their mouths and rub their eyes with their hands. Teens and adults run the risk of becoming infected too because they play games in the yard and do yard work. Parasitic infections can make humans very sick and can be very harmful to pregnant women.

According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), pet droppings can contribute to diseases animals pass to humans, called Zoonoses. Typical zoonoses include, but are not limited to:

Campylobacter – a bacterial infection which most commonly causes gastroenteritis, but may also cause illness affecting the entire body;

Cryptosporidiosis – a microscopic parasite that causes watery diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, fever and stomach cramps;

Salmonellosis – a bacterial infection which causes diarrhea, fever and abdominal cramps within 12 to 72 hours of infection;

Leptospirosis – a disease caused by Leptospira bacteria. Normally a sudden-onset illness, symptoms include fever, headaches, severe muscle pain, nausea, vomiting and bloodshot eyes; and

Ringworm – a persistent fungus. Ringworm is the collective name given to fungal infections of the hair and skin which can be caused by a series of fungal species.

Dog droppings left behind are very unsafe for our students. If your dog defecates on Lincoln School's campus or in any other public place, we urge you to do the following:

1. Get your plastic carry bag;
2. Place your hand on the inside of the bag;
3. Pick up your dog feces;
4. Fold the plastic bag back over your hand;
5. Remove your hand and tie a knot in the top of the bag;
6. Place the bag in a trash can; and finally
7. Wash your hands as soon as possible.

**BREAKFAST AND LUNCH LOANS**

In an effort to be in compliance with the Department of Education's revised meal loan practice, Lincoln School will not make unlimited meal loans to students who do not have funds in the *Meal Tracker* accounts.

The maximum meal loan amount is as follows:

For students eligible for free meals	No loan
For students eligible for reduced price meals	\$2.00 maximum
For students who pay the regular student price for meals	\$11.25 maximum

If there are no funds in your child's *Meal Tracker* account and the meal loan maximum has been reached, you should provide your child with breakfast at home and send your child to school with a home lunch.

The school's guidelines are reflected in the parent handbook regarding recommended deposits and loan balances. Please review the recommended School Meal Prices for the Month chart.

**Any parent having difficulty paying a loan should have their child eat breakfast at home and send her/his child to school with home lunch until the loan can be paid in full.**

**NEGATIVE MEAL TRACKER BALANCE STATEMENTS**

Parents/Guardians should be aware that Negative & Low Balance Meal Time Statements are sent home with their child every Tuesdays & Thursdays. If your child continues to have a negative balance in his/her *Meal Tracker* Account, Lincoln School's Office will notify you immediately. Please settle your child's loan by the next school day to avoid administrative action. Your cooperation in this matter is truly appreciated!

**MEAL TRACKER DEPOSITS:**



Parents or students may make deposits into their *Meal Tracker* accounts via cash or check (payable to Lincoln School) by dropping off payments in the *Meal Tracker* Deposit Box at the office between 7:30 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. daily. Payment envelopes and deposit slips are available on the office counter.

Parents who submit a bounced check will be charged a \$25.00 fee. Once the fee and the amount of the bounced check are paid in full, the office will then accept checks from those parents. However, the office will only accept cash from those parents as long as the fee and the amount of bounced check are unpaid.

Parents who send their children to school with deposits should direct them to the office. They should not give their payments to their homeroom teachers, because the teachers will not be responsible for making their students' deposits.

Upon receipt, deposits will be processed and the money will be available for use by your child 24 hours after the deposit date. Cash is not accepted on the line in the cafeteria during breakfast and lunch service.

Dear Parents/Guardians and Students,

The Holidays are here in full swing! Happy Holidays everyone! This month's Foodwise by Tyson foods features "Cooking with Kids & the benefits of baking together. The Holidays are a great time to create goodies together in the kitchen. Foodwise contains a simple cookie recipe that you and your child can make to give away as Christmas gifts. I'll also share a couple of my favorite healthy holiday recipes.

**Snowman on a Stick**

These banana-based snowmen are decidedly more tropical than the frosty variety, and kids can assemble their own if you prepare the fruit for them.

**Ingredients**

- Bananas, Grapes, Carrot, Apple
- Bamboo skewers
- Mini chocolate chips
- Pretzel sticks

**Instructions**

1. For each snowman, you will need three thick slices of banana, a grape, a sliver of carrot, and a triangular piece of apple. (Tip: Poke a hole in the apple piece with a bamboo skewer first to make assembly easier.)
2. Have your kids slide the fruit onto the skewer, and then use the carrot slivers for noses, mini chocolate chips for eyes and buttons, and pretzel sticks for arms.

**Mini Pizza Cups**

- 1 tube (11.3 ounces) refrigerated dinner rolls
- 1 can (8 ounces) pizza sauce
- 1/4 cup finely chopped onion
- 1/3 cup finely chopped green pepper
- 2 ounces sliced turkey pepperoni, chopped
- 1 cup (4 ounces) shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese
- Separate dough into eight rolls; cut each into quarters. Press dough onto the bottom and up the sides of miniature muffin cups coated with cooking spray.
- Spoon pizza sauce into each cup. Sprinkle with onion, green pepper, pepperoni and cheese. Bake at 375° for 15-18 minutes or until crusts are browned and cheese is melted. **Yield:** 32 appetizers.
